Approximately every 4 years the Community Assessment and Planning Committee of UWGK conducts a Community Needs Assessment. The goal of this assessment is to help determine the areas of highest need in which the UWGK along with community stakeholders can best serve the community. The 2021 survey solicited 100 community leaders across the Government, Education, Business, Medical/Health, Community Volunteer, Non-Profit, Faith-Based spectrum and asked them to rank 23 issues identified by the UWGK Visions Councils. This slide deck covers the top 10 needs ranked from the survey.





 As everywhere across the nation, overdose rates have increased during the COVID-19 pandemic in Sullivan County: -Average of 2 overdoses per day (fatal/non-fatal) -Average 6 fatal overdoses per month

• Drivers: Increased isolation and Fentanyl, a synthetic opioid that is 50% more powerful than heroin, is being added to other substances, including:

- vaping cartridges
- marijuana
- cocaine
- counterfeit opioid and other narcotic pills.



Key Gap Areas

- Lack of knowledge of resources for treatment and recovery
 - > It's easy to feel overwhelmed, especially when in crisis
- Substance use disorders and treatment options are still stigmatized in our region
 - > Stigma is one of the top barriers to seeking treatment
- Long-term treatment options and transitional services for employment, transportation and housing
 - A person often needs longer treatment and a fresh start
- Evidence-based youth prevention programs and mentorship opportunities
 - A child whose parent has a substance use disorder is at higher risk of developing one themselves





How to get connected

- Stop the stigma and use first person language such as a person with a substance use disorder instead of using words like addict or junkie
- Become a part of the recovery ecosystem
- Join the prevention network and become a youth mentor
- Be ready and know where to go for resources

Mental Health Support

- People seeking mental health support or have reported an intent to harm themselves, including children and youth, has increased during the pandemic due to:
 - > On-going isolation
 - Fear of becoming sick
 - Trauma from loss of family, income and daily routines
- Positive Results:
 - >Mental health has been discussed on global/national/local levels and decreasing the stigma associated with seeking help
 - The pandemic created more opportunities for tele-health appointments that has also eased the burden of stigma and transportation/scheduling conflicts





Screening Data Collected between January and September 2020

 In September, anxiety screens were up by 634% and depression screens were up 873% from January. Rates of suicidal ideation are highest among youth. In September 2020, over half of 11-17-year-olds reported having thoughts of suicide or self-harm more than half or nearly every day of the previous two weeks. Between April and September, 70% of people reported that loneliness or isolation was the top contributing



Key Gap Areas

 Lack of knowledge of resources for both signs of a mental health conditions and treatment options

> It's easy to feel overwhelmed, especially in a crisis

- Clinical staffing shortages at all levels for adult and youth services
 - > A person waiting for treatment may become a danger to themselves or others
- Safe-house and foster-care placements for older male teens > Older male teens with behavior issues do not usually meet the placement requirements







How to get connected

- Host or attend an educational seminar on Mental Health 101 and Suicide Prevention Awareness
- Consider becoming a youth mentor or foster parent
- Be ready and know where to go for resources






- In 2020, the Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) had 1,101 allegations of child sexual abuse. This represents 3.4 % of the children under 18 that reside in our service area
- 1 in 10 children will be sexually abused before 18 (1 in 7 girls and 1 in 25 boys)
- 90% of sexual abuse victim know their abuser and 60% are abused by people the family trusts
- Child sexual abuse has been linked to higher levels of risk behaviors and academic difficulties.











Key Gap Areas

- Lack of Safe Place for adolescent boys (Link House for girls)
- Not adequate Foster Care families available to meet the need
- Lack of Judges to handle all the cases timely
- Lack of transitional housing program for youth in these pending, unresolved and potentially unsafe environments.







Take Action

- Education: CAC hosts community presentations for adults and also evidence-based programming for youth. Schedule a training in your business, school, church, etc.
- Advocate for legislation that protects our children.

Child sexual abuse prevention starts with knowledge and awareness of the problem. Everyone in Tennessee is a mandated reporter under state law. Any person with reasonable cause to believe a child is being abused or neglected must, under the law, immediately report to the Tennessee Department of Children's Services or to local law enforcement. The reporter can remain anonymous.




- Age-Range for care: 0 5 years
- Access: Two-thirds of Tri-Cities parents reported problems accessing suitable child care
- Affordability: Two-thirds of Tri-Cities parents reported affordability as a significant challenge
- Quality: Over half of Tri-Cities parents reported finding quality care as a major problem impacting their employment.





Ratio of needed capacity for child care for children under 6 to child population based on parents in the labor force



Interpretation: In Washington County, there is 1 available child care slot for every 1.6 children under 6 years of age with all available parents in the labor force.

Key Gap Areas

- Currently, there is no one-stop resource that provides families a comprehensive and updated list of currently available spots.
- Head Starts and pre-k have limited hours (8am-2pm) Transportation and access to after-school programs for 4 year olds. Before school care 6am-8am.
- Childcare staffing pay rates are often low, under \$15 per hour. WAGE\$ program at DHS provides some financial stipends to those who qualify and are pursuing higher ed.
- Training for providers is available but not often accessed



Why Reading Proficiency by Gra

Key indicator of future academic success as well as lifelong socioecon

Children reading at grade level are...

MORE LIKELY

TO:

Department of Education

- Graduate from high school •
- Enter & complete post-secondary programs
- Remain gainfully employed later in life •

SIGNIFICANTLY Stay on grade level MORE LIKELY TO: over time

HIGHLY CORRELATED with high school completion and lifelong socioeconomic and health and wellness outcomes.

ASSOCIATED with higher rates of poverty, not keeping up with medical treatment, pre-teen alcohol use, depression, and teenage pregnancy.

KEY TAKEAWAY Low literacy rates negatively impacts our students and our state.



Grade 3 Reading/Language Arts Performance Levels

Key Take-Aways:

- Proficiency rates in 3rd grade ELA declined 38% in 2019 to 32% in 2021
- In 2020-21, stable trends in students scoring Mastered, with more students shifting from On-Track to Approaching.
- Data showed disproportionate increases in students scoring Below.

Key Gap Areas

- Limited accessibility to resources that enrich and aid students and/or parents and caregivers.
- Some Afterschool programs operate at or near capacity depending on funding and staffing levels.
- A child's brain architecture changes the most between 0-5 years old. A Safe, Stable, and Nurturing adult is the number one factor to build resilience in children. Including critical thinking skills. If a child cannot regulate, they cannot learn.







How to get connected

- Partner with Any of the Greater Kingsport Afterschool programs
- Become a volunteer, mentor and/or tutor
- All it takes is reading 20 minutes a day
- Families are supported through resources and parenting tools provided by Hope House of Kingsport, Sullivan County Health Department, Nurse Family Partnership, etc...

Emergency Shelters

- Salvation Army
 - > serving men, women, and families
- Hope Haven
 - > serving men (women and children shelter is currently not open)
- Family Promise
 - > serving families
- Kingsport Homeless Ministries Grace House (2022)
 - >plans to serve men and women







Key Gap Areas - Homelessness

- Major gaps continue to be housing, transportation, and employment
- Transitional Housing is also a need in Kingsport Friends and Neighbors is currently the only transitional housing provider serving families (housing up to 2 years) Hope House of Kingsport serves single women and babies
- Additional Street Outreach and continued Case Management are needed to help clients move toward self sufficiency





Key Gap Areas - Housing


- Kingsport Housing and Redevelopment Authority: As of the end of June, 99% occupancy rate with 1210 people on the waiting list.
- One bedrooms are in the highest demand.
- Priority is given to elderly, disabled and women needing to leave a violent situation.
- It can take 6 months to 1 year to move off the list and the list is considered low compared to many areas outside of NETN.








Kingsport's position in Tri-Cities Market



- 28.8% of Kingsport renters pay <\$500 per month
- Kingsport has 2,787 units of subsidized housing (low income housing tax credits, public housing, and vouchers)
- Kingsport has 30% more subsidized housing than Johnson City and 47% more than Bristol TN+VA
- 100% of Kingsport's subsidized multi-family complexes are within the city limits
- Kingsport was named one of the cheapest to live in Tennessee on rent.com (2/4/2021):

How to get connected


- Volunteer for local non-profits assisting individuals experiencing homelessness


Soft Skills Development Through the Tennessee Work Ethic Distinction

A soft-skills building strategy that is used by K-12 school systems in the Northeast region is the Tennessee Work Ethic Distinction. Students can earn points for completing work ethic standards such as:

- Maintaining Good Attendance
- Staying Drug Free
- Participating in Community Service
- Gaining Work Experience
- Earning a National Career Readiness Certificate and more...

Students who earn 32 points receive the Work Ethic Distinction along with their high school diploma. Partnering employers make the commitment to grant a job interview to any qualified applicant who applies for an open position and has successfully attained the Work Ethic Distinction. - Lack of self-awareness: It can be difficult to identify skills that we personally need to improve upon
- Individuals are not always aware of the skills they will need in the workplace

How to get connected

- Northeast State's Career & Workforce Development Center offers career guidance and employability workshops to students and the general public.
- KHRA's Family Self Sufficiency Program supports their residents through various services, many of which are related to the development of soft-skills, as they work towards becoming self-sufficient and gaining economic independence.
- The Kingsport Chamber of Commerce offers leadership programs that help individuals hone their leadership skills, as well as other soft skills.









- According to Second Harvest Food Bank, food insecurity levels had begun to level off at 14.3 % in 2017 and 2018
- The last official numbers were from 2019, which showed an increase to 15.3%
- The projected numbers for 2020 and during the height of the pandemic shut-down is an increase to 18.8%
- Estimated numbers for 2021 are a decrease to 16.6%












FOOD INSECURITY RATE IN SULLIVAN

 - Many elderly residents and those living in rural locations do not have access to the internet or proficiency in using it
- Lack of transportation to buy own food or access food pantries Lack of transportation has been compounded by fear of catching or spreading COVID-19






- TN ranks as the 5th worst state for violence against women
- Domestic violence crimes include murder, kidnapping, sex offenses, trafficking, assault, imtimidation and stalking
- On average, a victim will attempt to leave seven times before staying away for good. Exiting the relationship is the most unsafe time for a victim. As the abuser senses that they're losing power, they will often act in dangerous ways to regain control over their victim.












- Community recognition of issue and lack of knowledge of programs and resources for victims
 - There is much misunderstanding and stigma related to domestic abuse > Knowing pets are secure can help in making an exit plan


